

A few helpful tips for a successful garage sale:

- ♦ Be visible from the street. Put a sign or balloons in your yard if you are holding your sale at the back of your driveway.
- ♦ Make items visible. Move some items to your driveway toward the front of your house.
- ♦ Hang clothes instead of leaving them in boxes or folded on tables.
- Price some items. It's not necessary to price every single item, but give shoppers an idea of what prices you expect so they aren't scared to ask.
- ♦ Save your used grocery sacks to bag up items shoppers buy.
- ♦ Have plenty of change and small denominations ready.
- ♦ Be prepared for early bird shoppers arriving at or before 8:00 a.m.









CONSTABLE PROGRAM FUNDRAISING UPDATE

In February we reported that we were running low on meeting our goal for Constable donations. Our updated running behind our projected donations, so please consider donating to this well-needed safety program.

The requested donation for each household is \$250, however, we'll take a partial donation as every amount helps us reach our goal.

Some benefits of having a Constable patrol our neighborhood:

- 80 hours of patrolling per week in SPP and Candlelight Plaza.
- Vacation watch when traveling (must be requested).
- Increased patrolling for speeding violations to protect our residents, children and pets.
- Lower crime rates for SPP.
- The Constables can issue tickets, arrest suspects, investigate crimes and provide a presence that deters criminals in our neighborhood.
- The Constables can perform a check of your home (by appointment) to determine areas where you can improve the security of your family and property.

Our goal is to raise \$108,000 for the 2017 Constable Patrol Program for 2 officers (shared with Candlelight Plaza). To date, we're about \$16,000 away from that goal (see graph to the right). Approximately 50% of households in SPP are donating to this program!

PIP (Positive Interaction Program) REPORT

Captain Baimbridge, Commander of Houston Police Department's North Division, says the new police chief, Art Acevedo, is very open and friendly. He wants the department to be more responsive and have more officers on the street. To this end there will be a lot of changes coming, especially in early April. The Overtime Initiative is still being funded by money contributed by the two Council Members in our area. This effort is being concentrated in the Antoine and Airline Drive corridors. Nothing has changed with HPD regarding the stopping of immigrants. They have always checked identities of everyone they stop and will continue to do so.

Jeff McShan, who lives in Garden Oaks and was a former reporter for KHOU TV, is now with Crimestoppers of Houston. He says the number of tips to Crimestoppers is down and they are trying to determine why. They may raise the amounts awarded to informers. All money awarded in the program is raised through donations and in fees charged to convicted criminals. The calls to the tip line are truly anonymous and therefore any money received for a tip that catches a criminal is not taxable. program's inception 35 years ago, they have solved 33,000 cases with 26,000 criminals arrested. The group has a very active program in local schools having just reached their one millionth student. Over the years students have turned in tips that have resulted in 275 guns and \$17,000 in drugs being removed from schools. The most frequent tip reported by students is for bullying. After being located for years in various leased facilities, the organization has just moved into their new three story glass building - the Dave Ward Building.

UTILITY EASEMENTS

Most lots in SPP have a five foot utility easement in the back, with the exception of the South side of Chamboard and the West side of Apollo where special circumstances apply. Each home/lot has half of a ten foot utility easement where power poles and lines, telephone cables, cable company lines, CenterPoint gas lines, and city sanitary sewer lines are located. In most cases the water lines and storm sewer lines are located in the front of your home.

Residents/owners are prohibited from building on this easement and should refrain from planting large trees there. Normally this is not a problem unless you decide to go to two stories on your garage. The five foot easement becomes a ten foot utility easement on each side of the property line when you get to twenty feet in elevation and above. Be aware of this if you decide to build or remodel, especially if you will have tall ceilings or a gable roof.

SINGLE FAMILY RESIDENCES

In the deed restrictions of all four sections of SPP it plainly states that our homes are to only be used as single family residences. We understand that there are instances where members of an extended family live together. Grown children, parents, grandparents, siblings, and other close relatives often live with a homeowner for various reasons. Even visitors may stay for a short while on a temporary basis. It is never acceptable to rent out rooms to anyone, or to provide living quarters for domestic help. This is one of the instances where the City Legal Department will intervene on our behalf to enforce our deed restrictions.

This will complete one round of curb painting and next year we will start over by painting the numbers in section one again. We are doing basic numbers only, two per house, on each side of the driveway. On corner lots where the driveway is on the side street, the numbers will be in front of the home and near the corner. They will not do custom numbers nor paint over custom numbers. Try not to drive along the curb against the numbers, especially when the paint is fresh.

MORE TRASH FACTS by: Chuck Blesener

We continue with the City Of Houston rules for trash and recycling collection. Call 311 if your trash or recyclables are not collected after being placed out on the correct day and times, if you have problems with a broken cart, or if you have problems with Solid Waste Department vehicles or employees. In the latter case you will need to report the address, date and time, and the vehicle number.

Besides the garbage and recyclables placed in the black and green carts, each week residents can place for collection yard wastes and tree trimmings. These should be placed in City approved compostable plastic bags with the City logo on them. Small branches from bushes or trees can be tied in bundles of less than four feet in length, less than eighteen inches in diameter, and less than fifty pounds in weight. They should be placed at the curb at least three feet from all carts and other obstructions.

Once each month the city will pick up heavy trash on the third Thursday. In odd numbered months they collect tree waste - clean wood waste, tree limbs, branches, and stumps. In even numbered months they collect household junk waste - furniture, appliances, lumber - not over eight cubic yards and no contractor debris. All appliances with refrigerant must have a tag attached certifying that a technician has removed the refrigerant. Heavy trash can be placed at the curb any time after 6 p.m. on the Friday before collection day and must be placed there before 7 a.m. on the third Thursday. On junk waste months residents may place up to four tires at the curb for collection.

Used motor oil may be placed in sealed containers on the ground near your carts on any Tuesday collection day. Oil, paint, hazardous materials, flammables, or toxic materials should never be placed in your cart. If these materials leak out on the street, cause damage to or destroy the city trucks, or start a fire, every effort will be made to determine where they were picked up and the responsible party will be fined and billed for the cost of city equipment.

Flower Arranging Tips - Taught at the March Garden Club Meeting

In March, our very knowledgeable speaker, Lauren Garza, instructed Garden Club Members in the art of flower arranging. She started with an empty vessel and created the gorgeous arrangement shown to the right in her time with us.

While she was creating, she shared these clever tips with us:

- Be creative with your containers use interesting bowls, canisters, pitchers, etc.
- Be sure to have a sturdy base to secure the flowers in your arrangement
 - Two of Lauren's favorite materials to use are coated chicken wire and clear floral tape.
 - ♦ Twist the opposite corners of the chicken wire to form a ball and then stuff it into your container makes for a very secure base.
 - ♦ Create a grid on the mouth of the container with the clear floral tape makes for easy, durable support your flowers will be snug and stay in place.
- Create your arrangement in three layers
 - The base
 - A big focal flower
 - Fillers be sure to include interesting items berries, ivies, branches from your garden
- The height of your arrangement should be 1 ½ times the height of the container
- To make roses last longer, snip the bottom and place them in warm water; also blow into the bud itself to
