STORM SEWER AND ROAD PAVING PROJECTS BY: CHUCK BLESENER



The contractor hired by the City to replace the sanitary sewer lines in our neighborhood has completed the project and left the area. They were not gone long when another contractor working for Center Point Energy moved in to replace, move, and abandon some of the natural gas lines in our area. Light poles have been replaced and set back on Pinemont. This is some of the preliminary work necessary before the start of two large storm drain and road paving projects. Both projects have been included in the City Capital I mprovement Plan for many years but have been delayed multiple times for various reasons over the last couple years.

The first project beginning in the first quarter of 2016 is the completion of the Pinemont widening from Ella to Shepherd. After placing massive new storm drains down the middle, the street will be widened with curb and gutters and new sidewalks. The project had been delayed for new engineering work after the City passed a new ordinance allowing for underground detention of storm water rather than building detention ponds on the surface.

The second project is the installation of new larger storm sewers and road repaving on Alba, Chamboard, and Brinkman. On Alba and Brinkman this will include widening and lowering pavement with curb and gutters and sidewalks added. This is the first phase of a 635-day, three phase project that will begin at Alba and Judiway. The current schedule is now slated to be: job bids in December 2015, contractor awards in February 2016, and construction start in May 2016. The project had a major delay when Garden Oaks protested the engineering plans. They did not want sidewalks, wanted to keep their ditches, and did not want Alba becoming a major traffic artery. The compromise includes widening Alba from 19 feet to 21 feet and not the city standard of 27 feet.

Be prepared for major construction in the area and possibly altering your normal driving routes. The inconvenience will be worth it to get better streets and improved storm drainage, especially if your street floods or you have had water in your home.






SSP HAYRIDE A CROWD FAVORITE!!








SHEPHERD PARK PLAZA MEN'S GROUP

Our deputies have notified us that they have encountered friends or family members who have interfered with a traffic stop or investigation. If you approach a traffic stop or investigation because of your concern for a family member or friend, the deputy will usually ask you to step aside until they have completed their investigation and will then talk to you. Continued interference may result in the deputy placing you in the back seat of a patrol car or under arrest. The officers have a job to do and need to devote their full attention to the matter at hand, so please don't compromise or contaminate a crime scene. If you know, or even suspect a crime has been committed, call HPD or Constable Dispatch immediately and let them investigate. By touching, moving, or removing items at the scene, you are making the subsequent investigation more difficult, and could possibly be letting a criminal avoid prosecution.

Traffic Tickets: Our deputies write citations for traffic violations and have radar units in their cars. In the past, as a courtesy to our residents, they have been giving warning tickets to residents who live in the neighborhood and real tickets to repeat violators and those drivers cutting through our neighborhood. Effective immediately, the department will be issuing more tickets and fewer warnings. The real motivation for safe driving skills should be the safety and security of our families, children, and neighbors.



SOLICITORS - No Soliciting



We continue to have problems with solicitors going to homes in the neighborhood. Other than Girl Scouts selling cookies, and a few other charitable exceptions, it is a good policy not to buy anything, sign anything, hire anyone, or contribute to anyone coming to your door. They may sound legitimate and have a good story, but in most cases they are not who they say they are and want to take your money and/or identity. If they come at unreasonable times, are demanding or abusive, or refuse to leave when requested to do so, call Constable Dispatch at 713-755-7628. You should deal directly with reputable charities, order your magazines by mail or online, and only hire workers with verifiable references. Not all solicitors come to your door. Many are calling on the phone trying to sell a product or service, even requesting a home visit. Irreputable alarm companies and other vendors, questionable charities, and scam artists use high pressure tactics to separate you from your money. Use the same caution with callers you use at your door. A good policy is not to purchase anything, donate to anyone, or provide any information to anyone who calls you on the phone.

TRASH COLLECTION—Lately there has been an increase in our neighborhood of bags of lawn clippings at the street for days before collection. It is ugly and illegal. If you hire a lawn service to do your yard, they are required by City ordinance to haul off these bags as part of their cost of doing business. Any contractor you hire to do any work on or around your home must haul off any waste material. If you do your own yard work or maintenance, you may place your bags or waste materials at the curb in approved containers but not before 6:00 p.m. on the day before collection.



LOOSE DOGS - Facebook is still busy with notices of lost and found dogs. Even if your dog is always in the house, or always in a fenced yard, all dogs get loose at some time in their life. Please get an identity collar for your pet with a phone number or name and address or have them microchipped. Both of these things will improve their chances of being returned home safely after they've gotten loose.
