

Rebuild Houston Improves Brinkman Bridge

The City of Houston has improved the bridge located in the 4900 block of Brinkman. A concrete culvert bridge, with a life expectancy of more than 50 years, has replaced the original timber bridge. With an estimated cost of \$168,000, the project was funded by the ReBuild Houston Initiative, the voter-approved "pay as you go" plan to rebuild drainage and street infrastructure. 

EASY PINEAPPLE NUT CAKE

Cake

2 cups all purpose flour

2 cups sugar

1 tsp baking soda

1 tsp baking powder

½ cup chopped nuts

2 egg

20-oz can crushed pineapple with juice

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Mix all ingredients and pour into greased and floured 13 x 9 cake pan or bundt cake pan. Bake 35-40 minutes in 350 degree oven until cake pulls away slightly from edges of pan. Cool on cake rack.

Water Smart to Stay Green & Save!

With rising water costs and stressed water resources, making small changes to your lawn maintenance can make a big difference. In the Dallas and Houston regions, about 52 billion gallons of water annually could be saved by reducing lawn watering to twice a week. Water policy experts at Texas A&M University say the common reasons for overwatering are running sprinklers too long and damaged sprinkler equipment. If you're not ready to give up your grass, keep these money- and cost-saving tips in mind while keeping your lawn green:

- Water morning or evening when temperatures are cooler.
- Don't scalp your lawn. A taller lawn holds moisture better.
- Adjust sprinklers to water grass and plants—not structures or sidewalks.
- Nourish your lawn with fertilizer so it's stronger and less water-stressed.
- Keep weeds out of grassy areas—they are water hogs.
- Aerate your lawn annually so water can reach the root system.
- Check faucets, sprinklers and hoses for leaks.
- Use a broom instead of a hose to clean sidewalks and driveways.
- Change watering schedule as weather and seasons change.

Taking Care of Area Signage



Residents have reported that some of the signs around the neighborhood are faded, missing, or unreadable. We have some replacement signs in storage, but have waited to install because vandals were taking signs for the aluminum.

- Street signs, stop signs, yield signs, and other parking or traffic control signs that are missing, damaged, or unreadable should be reported to 311.
- 'We Love Our Children Please Drive Carefully' signs were installed by SPPCC and Plaza Moms and can be replaced as needed.
- Neighborhood Watch and HPD signs were installed at different times. The City strictly limits the number we can have and the price for these has quadrupled.
- Constable Patrol signs are newer and in better shape.
- CrimeStoppers signs have been posted for many years. We do have some newer ones that we can replace where needed.

Proper Parking Pays Off

Remember to obey parking rule and regulations right here in SPP. The City of Houston Parking Management division does patrol residential areas from time to time, and will issue citations if rules are being violated. Here are a few tips to avoid a ticket:

- Large vehicles (more than 22 feet long or 8 feet high) are prohibited from parking in residential neighborhoods day or night.
- Parking legally on the street requires both passenger-side wheels to be parallel with the curb and within 18 inches of it. This applies to cul-de-sacs as well no head-in parking is allowed.
- The sidewalk is a public right-of-way. It is illegal to block it with your vehicle even in your own driveway.
- It is a violation to leave a vehicle on the street for more than 24 hours, a trailer on the street for more than 2 hours, to park closer than 15 feet from a fire hydrant, closer than 20 feet from a crosswalk, and closer than 30 feet from a stop sign or traffic light.



Safe Sidewalk Update

Houston City Council recently passed an amendment to Chapter 40 concerning the repair of residential sidewalks. In Houston, homeowners are required to repair and maintain sidewalks along their property. This new process provides homeowners a way to reduce costs and expedite homeowner funded repair or replacement. The amended ordinance will waive the permit fees and bond requirements for homeowners to remove and replace existing sidewalks abutting their single family residential properties. Homeowners will submit their request to the Public Works & Engineering Department (PWE) website. PWE will then assess the site to see if construction is feasible and provide the cost estimate. The homeowner then submits payment to PWE upon approval of work order contract. PWE will monitor and approve the installation. IT'S RAINING CATS AND DOGS



City Responds to Nuisance Dogs By Chuck Blesener

Lets talk about man's best friend. Everyone loves their dog, yet they are the cause of many neighborhood complaints. Dog ownership does come with responsibilities. We receive complaints from neighbors about dogs that bark at all hours, repeatedly escape their yards and run loose, or defecate on neighbors' property.

The City has stringent rules governing dangerous and aggressive dogs in the Houston Municipal Code of Ordinances. In March 2014, Chapter 6, Article 6 was amended to include nuisance dogs in that category to address many citizen complaints. Section 6-151 defines a Public Nuisance Dog as a dog that:

- Substantially interferes with the right to enjoyment of life or property by persons other than the owner by acts including, but not limited to, frequent, long, or continued barking or howling, repeated defecation on property other than that of the owner, or damaging property other than that of the owner;
- Attacks domestic animals;
- Is documented by the Bureau of Animal Regulation and Care (BARC), a police officer, a neighborhood protection official or a member of the public to be running at large 3 or more times in a 12 month period; or
- Is one of a number of dogs or other animals maintained on the property owned or controlled by its owner so as to be dangerous to the public health, safety, or welfare.

If a neighbor's dog is posing a problem, the first remedy is to talk with the dog's owner about the problem. If that does not resolve the issue, you now have other means to pursue a resolution and can call 311 to report your problem. BARC has primary responsibility for enforcement and does keep a log of reports and complaints as you might have to call repeatedly to get results. If the problem is severe enough and repeated often, you can also call HPD, the Constable Dispatch, or Neighborhood Protection (also 311). Your report may be referred back to BARC, but if your situation is jeopardizing personal safety and involves an aggressive or dangerous dog, immediate help is available.

Feral Cats

Hello neighbors. My name is Catherine Powell, and I am a 4 year resident of SPP. I have taken it upon myself to try and get the feral cat population under control in our neighborhood. With the support of many of you, I am currently trapping, neutering, and releasing ("TNR") many feral cats. I have already trapped 17 cats, including 5 pregnant females. I am working with the Oak Forest Feral Cat Program, as well as a local veterinary clinic for low cost spay/neuters. I have tested many of these cats for feline leukemia and FIV, and all have been negative. After they are altered, each cat has their left ear 'notched', vaccinated for rabies, and given a treatment for fleas. If you see a cat with the tip of their right ear gone, it is healthy and altered. If you have a problem with *feral* cats in your yard, feel free to contact me, however, I must limit my TNR services to Shepherd Park Plaza. If you have a *pet* cat that roams around outside without a collar, please contact me with a description of your location and your cat so that I can keep an eye out. Please be aware that I might be setting traps all over the neighborhood early in the mornings. Our constable, James, is aware of my presence and both of my cars have a green SPP sticker on them. Constable Program and Citizens on Patrol

It may be news to many residents of SPP, but at one time our neighborhood did not enjoy the safety and tranquility to which we have become accustomed. In the late '80's our neighborhood experienced a dramatic increase in crime. Bold burglaries of homes and vehicles were occurring at a rate of about one per *day*. In an effort to impact this trend, a group of SPP residents worked with HPD to organize the SPP Citizens Patrol in 1991. As a result, burglaries declined by over 70% in the first year. To this day, the SPP Citizens Patrol is considered a "model" program whose leaders are regularly sought out by other neighborhoods seeking to start their own programs. Its impact is still being felt with an average of one burglary per *month*.

In 2000, SPP decided to further build on the crime prevention activities of the SPP Citizens Patrol by participating in the Contract Deputy Constable Program. This program exists because of the voluntary financial support of just over 60% of the residents of SPP. In 2014 SPP partnered with Candlelight Plaza to add a second Deputy Constable.

The Constable program offers SPP several benefits in addition to the obvious crime deterrent effect of having marked patrol cars with licensed law enforcement officers patrolling our neighborhood. These include:

- ◆ You can choose to have your household alarm responder be the Constable's office. The Constable can respond much more quickly to home alarms.
- ♦ You can notify Constable Dispatch of your vacation plans and have our deputies pay extra attention to your home while you are away.
- Women can participate in a multi-part safety program for up to 13 residents (more details to come on this in June).
- You can have the Constable's office perform a safety check of your home (as it relates to preventing burglary of your property).

To support the Deputy Constable Program the Civic Club requests voluntary donations of \$\frac{\\$200}{\$200}\$ per household per year, so for less than the cost of a cup of coffee per day you get all the benefits listed above. If \$200 is more than you can afford, any financial support is gladly accepted. Many residents are able to donate more to help supplement the financial support of those who cannot donate as much, so please consider sponsoring one of your neighbors that is a long-time resident that might be on a fixed income – even a \$25 sponsorship for a neighbor's portion helps. The main benefit is **visibility.**

Our partnership with Candlelight Plaza helps, but we also need your help to maintain the extra protection provided by having a second Deputy Constable. Please donate. 

Update: Requesting a Traffic Initiative

In recent issues, we discussed how to request a traffic initiative to address traffic problems near your home. The command staff at the Precinct One Constable's office has clarified how to request this procedure. To avoid tying up dispatch operations, they have asked that all such requests be channeled through our Patrol Coordinator who will forward them to the Constable's office.

Please keep in mind that our two Constable deputies already patrol the whole neighborhood, are familiar with trouble spots where people speed and run stop signs, and do issue tickets when warranted. The deputies report that many cars that appear to be speeding are usually traveling slower than the 30 MPH speed limit, our traffic court judges will throw out any ticket for speed not exceeding 35 MPH in a 30 MPH zone, and most violators are neighborhood. If you feel that a special traffic initiative is needed, please contact Chuck Blesener at constableliaison@shepherdparkplaza.com with your request.


