BUILDING PERMITS CONTINUED

Contrary to what some residents believe, the deed restrictions in all four sections of Shepherd Park Plaza remain in effect and enforceable. The deed restrictions for each section have an ending date but also contain an automatic renewal clause. They are automatically renewed for successive ten year periods unless voted on by a majority of property owners in each section. Any property owner can sue to remedy a violation of a deed restriction within their section. The City of Houston Legal Department helps enforce certain deed restriction items. Not only are residents subject to deed restrictions but **builders** investing in the neighborhood by purchasing, renovating and selling a home are also subject to the deed restrictions.

Great care must be taken when hiring a contractor. Many of them can place a lien against your home while you dispute the quality of the work or the price being charged. Contractors are not required to have a license for structural permits but are for mechanical, electrical, and plumbing work. There is a voluntary registration program for roofing contractors. All contractors must have proof of comprehensive general liability insurance with minimum limits of \$500,000 for both death or bodily injury and property damage - per occurrence.

There are reasons for most building codes and many of them could save your life. Bedroom windows must be the correct size to insure that in the event of a fire, you can get out and the firefighters can get in. To confirm whether a registered architect or professional engineer is required for your specific project contact http://www.tbae.state.tx.us/ or http://www.tbae.state.tx.us/.

The state of Texas has an energy code which places restrictions on the building components to reduce the overall energy consumption of the building. Items affected by this code are windows, wall ceiling insulation, air-conditioning equipment and ducts. If you plan on remodeling or repairing, ensure that your project conforms to this code. Trees are protected by the City of Houston. Trees within the building setback line may not be cut down or destroyed.

Non permitted construction activity can result in the issuance of citations, so if you are not sure if a permit is required, or what code is to be followed, call the Customer Assistance & Code Development office at 832-394-9494 or go to www.houstonpermittingcenter.org/building-code-enforcement.html.

- -Submit a monthly report (Form Provided)

Pumpkin Cheesecake Monkey Bread

- 4 cans (7.5 oz each) of plain refrigerated biscuits
- 1/2 cup granulated sugar
- 2 Tbs pumpkin pie spice
- 1 stick butter
- 3 oz. cream cheese
- 1 cup packed light brown sugar
- 1/3 cup pumpkin puree (canned)

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Coat bundt pan with non-stick spray. Set aside. In zipper type bag, mix granulated sugar and pumpkin pie spice. Separate biscuits and cut each biscuit into quarters. Add biscuit sections to the sugar and spice mix, shaking bag to coat biscuits well. Place biscuits evenly in bundt pan. In saucepan, mix brown sugar, butter, pumpkin puree and cream cheese. On low heat, mix and stir until all ingredients are melted. Pour mixture over biscuit sections in pan. Bake for 30-35 minutes. Remove from oven. Cool 2 minutes and place on heat resistant servicing dish. Makes a great Thanksgiving breakfast dish.

HONORING U. S. VETERANS ON NOVEMBER 11th



Part of the rich heritage of the U. S. is its military members that have served domestically and internationally for over 200 years. In order to honor our veterans, the U. S. Government made November 11th an official federal holiday in 1954. It actually evolved from Armistice Day, which began in 1919. The historical significance of our veterans' actions, commitment, tenacity and bravery cannot be fully measured. Can you imagine deciding at 18, 21, 25 or 40 years of age to leave your family, your home, possibly your country to fight for millions of American citizens that you've never met? To be met with an enemy that you've never met? To make decisions that put your life in danger? That's essentially what these brave men and women do when they enlist. For this and many brave acts too numerous to name here, we thank you! And God bless you!

Shepherd Park Plaza has many veterans within its boundaries. We'd like to take a brief moment to recognize their service to our country. The veterans who asked to be included herein (with their personal notes) are:

- * Helen McGee, age 98, a long time resident of SPP now living at Brookdale, remembers her service with the WAVES (Women Accepted for Volunteer Emergency Service), the WWII division of the US Naval Reserve. Helen enlisted in 1942, completed boot camp in NY, and received training at Indiana University. She was stationed at the Naval Air Station in Green Coves Spring, Florida working as a bookkeeper in the supply distribution unit supporting pilots. In 1945, her journey lead her to Charleston, SC; while awaiting her discharge, Helen worked in the payroll department of the naval station near a German POW camp that was established there.
- * Bill McReynolds served in Army Signal Corps from 1956 1958.
- * Peter Mytchak. Mytchak served the U.S. Army in the Korean Conflict.
- * Gus Oppermann. A veteran of the Korean War serving in the 1st Armored Division of the Army.
- * Louis Pali who served in the United States Army during the Vietnam and Korean Wars. He served a total of six years 2 years active duty, 2 years active reserve duty, and 2 years inactive reserve duty. He was honorably discharged with rank of E5.
- * J. Royce Simpson who was a combat Veteran serving in the U. S. Army from 1969-1971.
- * James Tamborello was a Staff Sergeant in the U.S. Army from 1943-1945.
- * James Worthing. Worthing served in the U. S. Navy in the Korean conflict from 1951 1955. He served on the Submarine the USS Runner SS-476 with a rating FT1(SS).



Garden Club Visits Buchanan's for the Monthly Meeting

The Garden Club met at Buchanan's Nursery on Monday, October 12 for a walking tour and talk through that beautiful nursery. Besides hearing about the different native plants, perennials, and shade plants available at Buchanan's, we also learned a few tips from our master gardener guide - such as:

- •When preparing beds, mix expanded shale in gumbo-type soil to help loosen it up. Recommendation is to lay 3 inches of expanded shale on top of the growing area and then till it six to eight inches deep.
- •If your potted plants have salt residue on them or on top of the soil, spray them with distilled water as it will remove all the minerals of hard water, as well as chemicals found in tap water like fluoride and chlorine.
- •Fall is the BEST time to plant a garden. Roots have time to establish themselves before our cool winters and then the onslaught of our HOT summers.
