In response, the Citizen Patrol Program was established in an effort to bring the citizens and the police department together for a common goal, and that is to improve the quality of life by eliminating crime. The Citizen Patrol Program is designed to provide a means for citizens to organize into patrol groups for the purpose of reducing crime in their community. PIP REPORT

At a recent Positive Interaction Program (PIP) meeting we were introduced to Captain Dan Harris, the new Commander of the HPD North Division. He started his career as a patrol officer 23 years ago at the old North Shepherd Substation. He said that Houston had more police officers on the street when he started than they do now. That does not bode well for the city considering the increase in population, cars, and territory in that time period. Because of the financial situation in the city he will have to prioritize manpower and overtime in his budget. More to follow in next month's Pulse.

ILLEGAL SIGNS by: Chuck Blesener

CODE OF ORDINANCES Chapter 28, Article 1, Section 28-39

It shall be unlawful for any person to place or cause to be placed, whether by posting, nailing, pasting, gluing or the use of any cohesive substance or in any manner whatever, any advertising sign, informational sign, poster, political advertisement, gummed label, bumper sticker, or any other advertising matter whatever on any utility pole, *tree*, fence, fire hydrant, street light standard, traffic light standard, stop sign or other traffic directional sign standard, or on any other structure of any kind whatsoever located in the public streets, sidewalks, alleyways, easements, public property, or any other public place in this city.

This ordinance applies to all illegally placed signs including garage sale signs, lost dog signs, realtor open house signs, property for rent or lease signs, and any business signs. The only legal signs in our neighborhood are one sign on your property advertising your home for sale.

RECOVERING STOLEN ITEMS

Many homeowners experience the theft of personal and household items and the shock of this invasion often leaves the person feeling vulnerable. It's the steps taken before this happens, however, that might help to recover some of your stolen items. Since many stolen items end up in local pawn shops or on Craigslist, the identification of your items might make all the difference. In short, IDENTIFY valuable items perhaps using one of the methods below:

- Keep an inventory list of valuable items including serial numbers for equipment, electronics, etc.
- Etch your name and address on items.
- Use identifying marks with special markers on items.
- Take and print pictures and keep them in a fireproof/waterproof location.
- Get appraisals on valuable jewelry to assist in identifying precious gemstones.

Check Craigslist or a few local pawnshops. If you find your item, notify the Constable or HPD - do not try to retrieve the items yourself.

And if you find yourself dealing with a theft of your property, START by filing a report to the Constable AND HPD. Also go to https://reportit.leadsonline.com/ to open a free, password protected account on REPORTIT, the Citizens Property Inventory System. It is a safe, secure, and free online database provided by LEADSONLINE. LEADSONLINE is the nation's largest online investigation system for law enforcement, providing rapid electronic access to transactions from thousands of reporting businesses including scrap metal processors, second-hand stores, internet drop-off stores, and pawn shops across the country, as well as information from eBAY listings for criminal investigations. This is the system our deputies and the police use to find and retrieve your stolen property.

FRAUD ALERTS!

Every day, thousands of people are victims of identity theft. The scams can range from telephone solicitations, to stolen mail, to promises of a cash windfall. A couple of tips to safeguard your personal information:

- ⇒ Don't provide social security numbers or account numbers to someone initiating a call TO you.
- ⇒ Shred all credit card solicitations received in the mail before discarding.
- ⇒ Don't respond to emails promising a cash back reward, or a cash refund reward in return for sending them a check first for a "processing" fee.
- ⇒ Don't respond to phone calls saying a loved one needs immediate cash while they're traveling or because they are in jail without some sort of verification of their identify. Consider establishing a family "identity" question that you can ask to confirm it's actually your loved one.
- ⇒ Protect your mail. Consider getting a mail slot in your front door instead of a mailbox that has no lock. (Check USPS for size specifications). If you don't have a mail slot, be sure to ask a neighbor to collect your mail while you're away.
- ⇒ Meet your elderly neighbors and let them know they are often targets and give them some tips to prevent being scammed.



HOUSE ADDRESS NUMBERS

In preparing the maps for our curb number painter, we noticed that there are a number of homes in our neighborhood that have no address number visible from the street. Your curb numbers are helpful to emergency vehicles unless parked vehicles block them from being read or they have become unreadable over time. By city ordinance and US Postal regulations, every home must have an address number posted. The Post Office is not required to deliver mail to any home without a number. The following organizations maintain emergency management data and require address numbers be posted and visible - US Postal Service, City of Houston (fire, police, ambulance), CenterPoint, GHC 911, Houston Emergency Center, HCAD, Harris County Tax Office, Code Enforcement, HCPID. If your home is lacking a visible house number, please add these to ensure that you can continue to receive all necessary services.

LAWN SERVICES By: Chuck Blesener

When the city began the current waste collection practices, they called in 1500 lawn service companies and explained the rules to them. If a lawn service charges for their services they are supposed to haul off the sacks of yard waste and not leave them at the curb for the city to collect. They were also informed that they were never to blow grass clippings or leaves into a storm drain which is an offense punishable by steep fines. These leaves also clog storm drains and can contribute to flooding in heavy rain.

You are responsible for the actions of anyone you hire on your property, including your lawn service. Talk to them and explain that you expect them to obey all laws and city ordinances.



MORE TRASH FACTS Chuck Blesener

COH Solid Waste Management does offer elderly and physically challenged customers who qualify, special collection assistance at no additional cost to them. You must submit a service request by calling 311, complete a Citizens With Disabilities Application For Services form, and send that in with a physicians certification. Allow 7 - 10 days for approval.

The City also provides dead animal collection. For small animals at the curb or in the street, call 311. The service is free and available Monday through Friday 8:00 a.m to 5:00 p.m. Large animals can be picked up for a fee by calling 311. For dead animals on a freeway or feeder road call TXDOT at 800-558-9368 or go to www.txdot.gov.
