Leash Laws for Houston

Recently, there have been lots of posts on Facebook about loose dogs. Some are outside of our neighborhood, but many are SPP residents' dogs that frequently get out of their enclosure. Please remember that not everyone is comfortable around dogs, so a dog rushing at them while they are out walking, running or biking can be frightening. Additionally, if a person is walking their dog on a leash and an unleashed dog approaches them, the reaction of either dog can be uncertain. Having animals restrained protects all animals involved. And lastly, unleashed dogs can cause a driver or cyclist to have to swerve or hit the animal and that would be unfortunate for all involved. Please remember that Houston has a leash law that requires that dogs (and cats) may not "run at large" in Houston. This means going on public or private property without the owner or another person having direct physical control of the animal is against the law. When not on a leash they must otherwise be restrained, either behind a fence or other enclosure that will prevent their escape.

CONSTABLE PROGRAM UPDATE


The annual kick off for the Constable Patrol Program began September 1st. We need your support! Please go online to our neighborhood website and make your annual contribution of \$290. 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Durham Elementary News

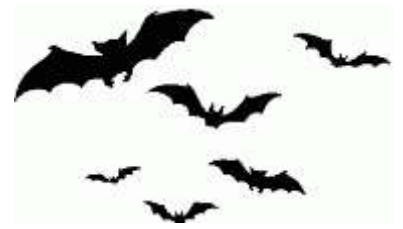
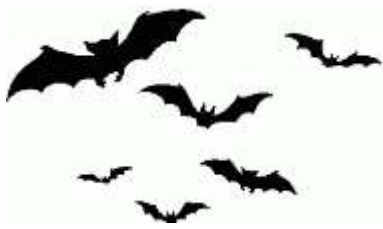

Your Board has developed the program described below which we feel is fair to all involved and will help make the holiday go more smoothly.

- ◆ Large signs will be posted at the entrances to SPP requesting the Trick or Treaters to follow some basic safety rules, trick or treat between 6:00 p.m. and 8:00 p.m. only, and go to houses which are well lighted.
- ◆ If trick or treaters are welcome to come to your home, please light up your house. Remember that it will be getting dark at 6:00 p.m.

- ◆ For your safety, remove "valuables" from the front of your home.

In response, the Citizen Patrol Program was established in an effort to bring the citizens and the police department together for a common goal, and that is to improve the quality of life by eliminating crime. North Shepherd Community Alliance Update (July)

The North Shepherd Community Alliance Monthly Meeting was held on July 15, 2018. Their mission is to promote responsible development of local businesses in the North Shepherd Area (Yale to TC Jester, I10 to I45), to network and support business owners, churches & schools, while embracing neighborhood history and diversity. Their topics of discussion are timely, not only because of the development of North Shepherd, but because other areas in the neighborhood are being developed, which increases population and brings up new issues. We attended by invitation. This presents an opportunity to meet new people (business and neighbors), and discuss and address concerns about development, crime, homelessness, etc. The attendees included our HPD North Division Captain Dan Harris, and the guest speaker, Richard Hill, who spoke about his non-profit mission's work with the homeless.

North Shepherd Community Alliance Update (August)

NSCA gave a Powerpoint presentation of photos of neighborhood problem spots. NSCA is asking for ideas from a personal level, expressing area needs, concentrating from I610 – I45.

They plan to take the list to the City of Houston, and Texas Department of Transportation for help in resolving the issues. Some of these issues include speeding on N. Shepherd, abandoned or poorly maintained properties, trash, overgrowth, graffiti, water puddling, drugs, gambling or other illegal activities, property invasion, blocked drainage ditches, vehicles parked on sidewalks, and absentee landlords. NSCA is in the process of making a map to show the precise problem spots and to identify the jurisdictions for the applicable City Council persons.

PIP (Positive Interaction Program) Report (July)

The HPD Narcotics Division Presentation was on the current Opiate Epidemic – in particular Fentanyl, which is a powerful synthetic opioid analgesic 50 to 100 times more potent than morphine! When prescribed by doctors it is used to treat patients with severe pain or to manage pain after surgery, sometimes patients with chronic pain, or patients who find other opioids to be ineffective. However, people can become addicted/dependent on it very quickly (in a few days). When they can no longer get it legally, some get it on the street. It is synthetic, which means it can be made up in someone's garage using components obtained online from China or from elsewhere, thus there is no quality control, so you cannot be sure of the dosage, and therefore it can be fatal.

PIP (Positive Interaction Program) Report (August)

The Powerpoint presentation by HPD Burglary and Theft Division was on Theft of Metals (including copper, aluminum, brass, and bronze). Some examples of items stolen are all variety of metal construction supplies, AT&T and Comcast battery boxes, telephone and other wire, air conditioning compressor coils, cemetery urns and figures. These are resold to metal recycling and scrap yards.

Some ways to combat these thefts are by installing security cameras, locking up supplies, making and keeping clear full photo and serial number records, spraying/marketing paint on items as a means of identifying stolen items. Report immediately to HPD Burglary and Theft Division 832-394-3727, as well as Constable Precinct 1, (713-755-7628).

STREET PARKING REMINDERS!

Are you having a party at your house soon? Or construction workers at your home doing renovations? Or do you have weekly lawn service? All these scenarios result in more cars on your street, so please remember to ask your guests to all park on the same side of the street pointing in the direction of traffic so emergency vehicles have room to maneuver. **Also, please remind workers and yard crews not to block access to your neighbors' trash and recycle bins on Tuesdays. The garbage and recycle trucks need lots of space and if they can't gain access to the bins, they'll just bypass that house. Lastly, vehicles should not be parked on the street for more than 24 hours.**

Garbage and Yard Waste Collection

GARBAGE COLLECTION

- City-provided containers must be placed at the curb between 6 p.m. the day before and 7 a.m. on the scheduled collection day.
- Place container on the curb facing the street with handle facing house.
- Containers must be accessible and not blocked by obstacles, including parked cars, trees, mailboxes, fencing etc. Blocked containers will not be emptied.
- Leave at least a three (3) feet space between garbage and recycling container to allow truck to safely operate.
- Remove containers from the curb line and/or public view by 10:00 p.m. on the day of collection and stored in a secure location.

Do NOT put the following in your BLACK GARBAGE container: Household chemicals, computer equipment, yard trimmings, hot ash/coal, dead animals and construction/demolition remodeling debris.

**Chemicals and hot ashes cause truck fires.*

YARD WASTE

Yard waste is grass clippings, leaves and small branches. It must be placed in City-approved compostable bags to be collected. The City-approved compostable bags may be purchased at local grocery or hardware stores; be sure to look for the City Logo on the box. Yard waste is collected weekly on the same day as your garbage. Place the bags at least 3 feet from your garbage cart. Filled bags must weigh less than 50 pounds. Bundle small branches less than 4-feet in length and smaller than 18-inches in diameter and place next to the bags for collection. Yard waste mixed with trash, paper, plastic or any other type of waste will not be collected. Work performed by a contractor such as a yard service company must be removed by the contractor.



**Look for bags with the city-approved logo.*

TREE WASTE/JUNK RECYCLING PROGRAM

Residents may dispose of their Tree Waste and Junk Waste at their curbside. Tree Waste is collected during ODD numbered months and Junk Waste is collected during EVEN numbered months.

TREE WASTE

YES! Accepted: Tree Limbs, Branches and Stumps

NO! Not Accepted: Lumber, Treated Wood and Furniture.

JUNK WASTE

YES! Accepted: Furniture, Appliances, and Bulky material.

NO! Not Accepted: Roofing, Shingles, Brick, Plaster and Concrete

RESTRICTIONS:

- ◆ No more than 8 cubic yards
- ◆ A maximum of 4 cubic yards of the 8 yards may be of building material generated by the resident in connection with the maintenance of the residential property.
- ◆ Tree/Junk Waste from contractors working on residential property will NOT be collected. Contractors are responsible for the removal of their debris and waste. This debris includes, but is not limited to: trimming and removal of trees, remodeling, new construction and roofing.
- ◆ If authorized items are mixed with unauthorized items, the material will NOT be sorted and will NOT be collected.

Note: Appliances containing refrigerant must have a tag attached to them certifying that a licensed HVAC technical has removed the refrigerant.

Environmental Service Centers

The Environmental Service Centers provide drive through drop-off locations for Houston residents to bring their household hazardous waste (HHW) such as anti-freeze, batteries, fuel, oil, paint, paint thinner, pesticides, herbicides and household cleaners. Residential electronic scrap items will also be accepted (monitors, televisions, printers, keyboards, mice, scanners, fax machines, telephone handsets, VCRs, CPUs, cellular phones and other small consumer electronics). These items should not be placed on the curb with or in your container for collection with garbage or tree waste / junk waste pickup. Clean, white Styrofoam blocks (plastic #6) are now accepted at the ESC-South location. Packing "peanuts" are not accepted.

Westpark Recycling Center

The Westpark Consumer Recycling Center is the City's premier drive-through recycling drop-off location. Accepted items include: aluminum and tin cans, household plastic containers #1-5 & 7, glass bottles and jars, paper, and cardboard. Also accepted batteries, used motor oil and filters, latex paint, antifreeze, electronics and tires. There is a box for clothes and shoes. Clean, white Styrofoam (plastic #6) is accepted at both Westpark and the ESC-South. Packing "peanuts" are not accepted. Styrofoam is not accepted in the curbside recycling program.

The center is open Monday through Saturday from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.

Curbside Recycling

YES! RECYCLE (Green Recycling container)

PAPER: Newspaper, magazines, catalogs, junk mail, office paper

PLASTIC: Containers #1 - 5 and 7 (*rinsed & drained*) examples include water and soda bottles, milk jugs, yogurt cups, margarine tubs, detergent bottles

ALUMINUM CANS (*rinsed & drained*)

BIMETAL CANS (*rinsed & drained*): Examples include soup cans, vegetable cans, fruit cans, coffee cans

CARDBOARD (*flattened*)

CARTONS: Gable top and shelf stable cartons, examples include milk cartons, juice cartons, soup cartons, soy milk/alternative milk cartons

NO! (DO NOT put in Green Recycling container)

Film or flexible plastics: examples include ALL plastic bags, shrink wrap, plastic wrapping from cases of water or soda, plastic cereal bags, cracker bags, etc.

Food contaminated paper, tissue paper, wrapping paper, paper towels or napkins.

Glass of any kind

Yard waste: E.g. leaves, grass, twigs, branches

Textiles: E.g. clothing, shoes, sheets, towels, pillows

Large plastic items: toys, garden hoses, coolers, furniture, buckets

Neighborhood Depository/Recycling Centers

The City operates six (6) Neighborhood Depositories and Recycling Centers to provide Houston residents a convenient opportunity to dispose of junk, tree and recyclable materials.

City of Houston residents may use the facilities up to four (4) times per month. Contractors and commercial business are prohibited from using the facilities. Citizens are responsible for the unloading of their own materials.

Citizens are encouraged to arrive at least 30 minutes before closing to allow adequate time to unload. Accepted items include junk waste-includes appliances, up to 5 tires off the rim, heavy trash, tree waste. Recycling items accepted include aluminum and tin cans, household plastic containers #1-5 & 7, glass bottles and jars, paper, cardboard and used motor oil. Clothes and shoes are accepted at the North, Southeast and Northeast Depositories.
