#### Positive Interaction Program ("PIP") Meeting October 17, 2019

Commander J. Stevens, the new Division Commander of Vehicular Crimes Division made a presentation on vehicular crashes, Injuries, crimes and accident reporting process. Some reminders:

- In a vehicular event, remain calm, check for injuries, call 911, note details of event (use note pad, pencil, cellphone pictures), get insurance and contact info from other party, and contact info from witnesses, be safe, do not smoke (it might ignite spilled fuel). Get your vehicle off the road if it is drivable, if not, put on warning lights, you get off road and wait for officers.
- Road cameras may not be working, so take your own pictures.
- ♦ Complete CR2 Form (this used to be Form CR 3) include other driver's insurance information and driver's license number give this to your insurance provider. It is no longer necessary to give this form to police. No incident reference number will be issued. You may have to go to headquarters to get a copy of their report. You can go to the Patrol Station to make your report.
- Tow truck drivers must stay 100 feet away. You can call and use your own AAA driver. Tell tow driver where you want your vehicle to go. Get the copy of tow slip.
- If you are injured and cannot get your possessions out of vehicle, ask the officer to inventory your possessions and record for you.
- Special note: If someone is committing *road rage* do not engage with them! Get away from it. Go to safe area. If gangs throw eggs at you, get away. Do not yell at them!

#### **New Year's Eve Safety Tips**

If you are planning to celebrate the arrival of 2020, please remember a few safety tips:

- ♦ If you drink, don't drive. When you head out for the evening, have the number of a taxi service or Uber in your cell phone.
- ♦ Have your cell phone fully charged before going out.
- ♦ Keep your money, phone and credit cards in in a pocket or pouch under your clothing.
- ♦ Use marked sidewalks/crosswalks.
- ♦ Use the "buddy" system. If you go out alone, let someone know when to expect you home and at what time.

## **Prevent Porch Package Theft NOW!**

We are days away from the holidays and the delivery of thousands of packages at homes in the area. Thieves know this and are planning, right now, to rip you off! Taking a few simple steps can protect you from falling victim to porch pirates. Ruin their plans not your Christmas!

Precinct One Constable Alan Rosen would like to remind you to consider these options in protecting yourself from porch package theft:

- Use a lock box or locker.
- Consider delivering packages to your office instead of home.
- Install security cameras.
- Give instructions to package delivery service. Both UPS and FEDEX will allow you to designate a specific location other than the porch where a package can be left or you can instruct them to leave it with a neighbor.
- Sign up for alerts so you know when your package arrives. Some delivery services will tell you when a package has been delivered. That can help you realize it's there so you can get it before someone else does.
- Require a signature for delivery if you can require it. That keeps the delivery person from leaving the package on the porch for someone to steal.
- Check your front porch frequently if you are expecting a package.

#### **More Holiday Safety Suggestions**

Houston Police Department also had some holiday safety tips that they passed along during their most recent Positive Interaction Program (PIP) Meeting.


- Be aware of surroundings.
- Maintain personal safety zone.
- Be aware of who is just sitting in a car.
- Park close to store entrances or in well-lit areas.
- Look under, behind and inside your car before getting in.
- Carry only what is necessary and use non-descript shopping bags.
- Watch for skimming devices at credit card machines and ATMs.
- Stay 1 1/2 car lengths behind car in front of you, especially at stop lights and stop signs.

With the recent return to standard time, it gets darker earlier than the previous months. Combine that with holiday shopping frenzies and a little too much alcohol on occasion, and walkers and joggers and bikers can be at a higher risk. Please wear reflective clothing or blinking lights and stick to the sidewalks.

#### SHEPHERD PARK PLAZA CITIZENS PATROL WELCOMES VOLUNTEERS!

The Houston Police Department is concerned about crime in the neighborhoods and communities throughout the city. In response, the Citizen Patrol Program was established in an effort to bring the citizens and the police department together for a common goal, and that is to improve the quality of life by eliminating crime. The Citizen Patrol Program is designed to provide a means for citizens to organize into patrol groups for the purpose of reducing crime in their community. Citizen Patrollers are the additional eyes and ears the police can count on to make Houston a safe place to live and work. The value of police/citizen cooperation is well illustrated by the success of the Citizen Patrol Program.

The winner of the \$10 random drawing is Bob Wottrich. Patrollers who turn in at least 4 driving hours by the 5th of the month are eligible for this drawing. We need volunteers. Training is just a few hours and you can be on your way to helping us protect the neighborhood.



On the evening of November 11th, The Garden Club met at the home of Ruth Rock for an informative presentation by Darla Harris of Fern Plantation. She spoke about ferns which grow so abundantly in our shady yards. Did you know that ferns are members of a group of vascular plants that reproduce via spores and have neither seeds nor flowers. Ferns are some of the oldest plants in the world. They first appear in the fossil record about 360 million years ago. Ferns can grow indoors or outside, mostly in shade or partly shaded areas. But indoor ferns need high humidity, which is hard for us to achieve with the air conditioner on during the summer and the heater on during the winter. For most ferns, keep the soil moist and add mulch on top of the soil to keep the moisture in. But they don't like to stand in water, so be sure you have proper drainage holes if you have your ferns in pots. There are about 10,560 known species of fern. Darla brought many of them for us to see. Some had fronds that looked like crocodile skin, some were mounted on a board, some that could be grown to 3' x 3', and others so tiny and delicate they could be indoors in a terrarium. She even had a rabbit's foot fern that had rhizomes that looked like a rabbit's foot. Some ferns are being studied as a help to counteract rising greenhouse gas emissions and global temperatures.

Our November Yard of the Month goes to Marti Turner! Marti enjoys fall flowers and her yard includes colorful narrow leaf and profusion zinnias, coleus, coreopsis, and chrysanthemums. Zinnias are a favorite because they are easy to grow in Houston's heat. Butterflies enjoy flitting among the zinnias in early autumn but have now gone south. In addition, the front yard still has a few blooms to enjoy from the summer impatiens and a knockout rose. As a transition to winter garden color, pansies were recently planted next to the zinnias. Background plants include daylilies, ferns, holly, and pittosporum, while liriope lines the walkway.
